There, we met with representatives from the World Bank who are proposing an initiative to advance digital connectivity in Tanzania. They are proposing plans to increase the number of cell towers and internet access for historically underserved rural areas in Tanzania.

OLANAKWE PARTICIPATES IN A UN PROJECT ON INDIGENOUS PEOPLES

The UN General Assembly adopted the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples (UNDRIP) in 2007. This Declaration lays out the minimum standards for the survival, dignity, and wellbeing of the world's Indigenous peoples and calls upon nations to prioritize the perspectives of Indigenous peoples and local communities. As part of this declaration, the UN Department of Economic and Social Affairs is starting a capacity building project in selected countries in Eastern and Southern Africa.

Olanakwe Community Fund was invited to submit a case study on our education initiatives. The report will be part of a capacity building toolkit that will be used in training workshops for Indigenous leaders, governments, NGOs, and donors. It will hopefully contribute to policy dialogues on how to promote the participation of Indigenous peoples in the global conservation. You can read the case study on our website here.
